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In the presence of Zayed bin Sultan bin Khalifa, Louvre Abu Dhabi and Richard Mille Announce Nicène Kossentini as Winner of the 2024 Richard Mille Art Prize

The winner was selected from the five shortlisted artists of the 2024 Louvre Abu Dhabi Art Here exhibition, showcasing contemporary art from emerging and established GCC and North African artists

Abu Dhabi, UAE, 13 December 2024: In the presence of Sheikh Zayed bin Sultan bin Khalifa Al Nahyan, a former advisor to the UAE Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA), Chairman of UAE Unlimited, an art collector, and a patron of the Centre Pompidou, the British Museum and Sharjah Art Foundation, Louvre Abu Dhabi and Richard Mille announced Nicène Kossentini as the winner of the fourth edition of the Richard Mille Art Prize. Nicène was one of five shortlisted artists to showcase her work, *Landscapes,* in the *Louvre Abu Dhabi Art Here 2024* exhibition. The artist accepted her award and prize of USD \$60,000 at the award ceremony that took place at Louvre Abu Dhabi on December 11.



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Nicène Kossentini, a Tunisian artist known for her interdisciplinary approach, uses her work to challenge how we perceive the passage of time and the ephemeral nature of the world around us. In her submission, *Landscapes*, Kossentini explores the theme of disappearance through five evocative video pieces, each depicting desolate landscapes from central and southern Tunisia. As the images unfold, they gradually freeze and fade beneath a layer of wax, symbolizing the gradual erasure of these places. This striking work reflects on the impermanence of both physical and emotional spaces, inviting viewers to engage more deeply with their surroundings and prompting a shift from passive observation to active contemplation of the fragility of time and existence.

Manuel Rabaté, Director of Louvre Abu Dhabi, said: "With each edition of Art Here, we witness the growth and evolution of contemporary art in the region, and this fourth edition has achieved an exceptional level of maturity and dynamism. This year's theme, Awakenings, has inspired artists to create works of profound depth and innovation, making the jury's decision an especially difficult one. We are deeply grateful for our partnership with Richard Mille allowing us to bring together esteemed experts and provide a platform for exceptional artists from the region to present their creations at Louvre Abu Dhabi, fostering the growth of contemporary art and inspiring audiences from around the globe."

Nicène was selected by a distinguished five-member jury, led by **Sheikh Zayed bin Sultan bin Khalifa Al Nahyan**, a former advisor to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA), Chairman of UAE Unlimited, an art collector, and a patron of the Centre Pompidou, the British Museum and Sharjah Art Foundation. Joining him are **Dr. Guilhem André**, Director of Scientific Curatorial and Collection Management at Louvre Abu Dhabi, **Simon Njami**, Art Here 2024 exhibition guest curator, **Nujoom Alghanem**, a renowned Emirati poet, artist and multi-award-winning film director, and **Maya Allison**, the founding director of the Art Gallery and Chief Curator at New York University Abu Dhabi.

Dr. Guilhem André, Director of Scientific, Curatorial and Collection Management at Louvre Abu Dhabi, commented: "Serving on the jury for the Richard Mille Art Prize was an inspiring experience, offering the chance to witness the exceptional contemporary art emerging from the UAE and the North Africa region. This year's theme, *Awakenings*, inspired thought-provoking works that reflect the cultural and social complexities of our time. By celebrating the creative contributions of the five shortlisted artists, we not only enrich the UAE's contemporary art scene but also strengthen its position as a global hub for artistic excellence and dialogue."

Simon Njami, Curator of Louvre Abu Dhabi Art Here 2024, said: "It was not an easy decision, given the exceptional quality of the proposals from the five shortlisted artists. However, after much deliberation, we concluded that Nicène Kossentini's work best responded to the multitude of questions posed by the theme and its various interpretations. *Horizon, Awakening*, and *Ouverture* were explored in a manner that was both subtle and poetic, yet profoundly impactful, earning the unanimous approval of the jury. I extend my gratitude to all the artists for their remarkable dedication, which elevates this award to an international standard of excellence."

For its fourth edition, *Louvre Abu Dhabi Art Here 2024* invited artists to propose artworks addressing this year's theme of 'Awakenings', exploring three key concepts reflected in Louvre Abu Dhabi's three official languages: *awakenings* (in English), *ouvertures* (openings in French) and [islanguages] (horizons in Arabic). Presented beneath the museum's iconic dome, the exhibition features a dynamic mix of sculpture, multimedia and installation art, reflecting the

region's evolving dialogue with heritage, environment, and culture. The theme encourages artists to explore ideas of openness and new beginnings, challenging them to translate these abstract concepts into tangible forms across various mediums.

Artworks featured in the fourth edition of *Louvre Abu Dhabi Art Here 2024* included: *Tilling the Soil* by Férielle Doulain-Zouari; *Debutante Ball* by Lamya Gargash; *The Brides of the Sky* by Moataz Nasr; *Landscapes* by Nicène Kossentini; and *Shared Motion* by Sarah Almehairi.

Tilly Harrison, Managing Director of Richard Mille Middle East, commented: "At Richard Mille, we are deeply inspired by the vision and creativity of artists like Nicène Kossentini. Her work, *Landscapes*, is more than just art—it's a profound meditation on the fragility of time and memory, ideas that resonate strongly with our own pursuit of precision and timeless beauty. It's been a privilege to partner with Louvre Abu Dhabi to support such extraordinary talent. Her ability to capture the essence of disappearance and invite us to reflect on what remains is truly remarkable. We are so proud to see her voice and vision recognized on this platform."

Nicène Kossentini, winner of the fourth edition of The Richard Mille Art Prize, said: "I am truly humbled and grateful to receive the 2024 Richard Mille Art Prize. My work, Landscapes, is an exploration of disappearance, both the physical and emotional erasure of the world around us. The landscapes I film in Tunisia, often abandoned or forgotten, serve as metaphors for the fragility of time and memory. With this recognition, I am deeply honoured to be part of a community that values not only the aesthetic dimensions of art, but also the stories and questions it provokes. I hope Landscapes invites viewers to reflect on what we are losing and, perhaps, to open their eyes to the urgency of what remains. I extend my heartfelt thanks to the Louvre Abu Dhabi and Richard Mille for their unwavering support of contemporary art."

Louvre Abu Dhabi Art Here and the prestigious Richard Mille Art Prize are key platforms for showcasing contemporary artists from the region, highlighting a broad spectrum of mediums. Each year, a select group of artists is chosen through an open call, presenting powerful works that engage with a unique, thought-provoking theme. Louvre Abu Dhabi Art Here 2024, featuring contemporary works from emerging and established GCC and North African artists, will be on display until December 15, 2024. The theme and call for proposal for the highly anticipated 2025 fifth edition of the Richard Mille Art Prize and Louvre Abu Dhabi Art Here exhibition will be announced in 2025.
